

Carolyn is a member of the Grimes American Legion Aux. Jim is a student at Iowa State University, and Julie is a student at the University of Iowa.




Donna, Dave, Ryan, Scott, Kirk

The family attends Mt. Olive Lutheran Church in Des Moines. Dave has served as treasurer of the church. Donna is in the Missionary League.




Vera (Karl's wife), Arlette, Thelma, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Roger, Gene, Karl, Jeannie






As they had no children, they adopted their 3 month old niece in 1868 and named her Ena Catherine. They also raised a boy by the name of Albert Burton.

Andy, Laura, Sara, Mary


