

Emma worked in the cafe then worked for the Old Grimes Canning Company. She retired because of ill health. Emma now lives in the Polk City Manor.




Maryan, Lonnie, Leroy, Leann, Shirley, Ruth


Shirley, Leann, Leroy, Chuck Kelly



Their three children were: Lloyd G., Ruby Livermore and Samuel E.


During the last years of Mr. Stewart's life, they lived in Mississippi. After Mr. Stewart's decease, his widow returned to Grimes where she spent her last years.



They were parents of four children: Tom, Donald, and Robert who live in Des Moines and Mary (Mrs. Ed Briggs) lives in rural Earlham.




Ernest Day farm








Toby and Irene, Jeanen, Gary

Stanley Paul Weiser was married to Pearl Marie Wipperman, daughter of Arthur and Matilda Wipperman, of Grimes, May 1940.

To this union was born a son, Stanley Jr., and a daughter, Donna (Weiser) Owen of Adel, Iowa.

Stanley Sr. attended Grimes school until a junior when his family moved to Des Moines. He graduated from North High as a member of National Honor Society, Debating team, and orchestra. He attended Drake University.

He established the Weiser Dairy Co. which operated in Polk and Dallas County for 28 years then established the Weiser Insurance Agency in Adel, Iowa. Stanley sings in the choir at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in West Des Moines.




Paul William Weiser (Aug. 1884 - Nov. 1958) was married to Kathryn Wilkie (Mar. 1885 - Nov. 1950) at St. Peter's Lutheran Church March 1910. To this union was born Stanley P., Adele K., and Eva Estelle.

Paul was a first graduate of Grimes High School. The 05 in white paint suddenly appeared after this graduation above the entry into the school and remained until the school was torn down.

Paul graduated from Des Moines Business College and was bookkeeper for Zinsmasters Bakery in Des Moines for a number of years. He then purchased the Grimes Dairy from his brother, Herbert, in 1931. He operated it until pasturized milk caused him to associate with his son's dairy in West Des Moines.

Paul and his brothers Walter, Earnest, and Elmer furnished as a quartet the special music on many occasions in Grimes and Des Moines.



Elmer Weiser (1878) "bachelor" he was organist in St. Peter's Lutheran Church for 20 years. He sang solos and was second tenor in the Weiser Quartet. The naming

of Sunny Hill Cemetery was attributed to him.

Elmer started the Weiser Dairy by measuring the milk in a dipper to the customers from a spout can, hauled in a spring wagon. In 1923 he sold the dairy to brother, Herbert. The facility was one of the better raw milk establishments sporting a modern barn, milkhouse and a horse drawn milk wagon from which ice chilled dairy products were delivered in sanitized glass bottles of measured size to the customers requirements.



Melvin Wiles was born in Grimes, Iowa in 1911, S of Grimes. Two years later the family moved to Des Moines and farmed on a farm at Merle Hay and Hickman Road. They also farmed at Prole and Martensdale.

The Wiles family moved to West Des Moines on a farm in 1920 where they milked 35 cows and bottled the milk and delivered to homes and stores in West Des Moines and Des Moines.

Melvin was graduated from Valley High in West Des Moines in 1928. Melvin was married to Eunice Hyde of Des Moines in 1932. They are the parents of three children, Beverly Jean, Melvin Eugene and Karen Lea.

Melvin started in the trucking business in 1933, hauling coal and paving material.

Melvin and Eunice moved back to Grimes in 1941 and Melvin ran the Standard Tank Wagon for three years, then he went into the oil business for Phillips Petroleum Company in 1944 and was there for 36 years. Their son, Melvin, Jr. was a partner for 15 years until his untimely death in 1977. The Wiles retired in August 1979 and are still living in Grimes.

In 1938 Merle and Jessie Wiese and family, Rheta and David moved to Grimes. Merle was employed by Beaver Valley Canning Company, later by Standard Oil Company. Rheta graduated from Grimes High School. Upon moving to Des Moines, David graduated from North High School and attended Drake 1 year, finishing college in Kankakee, Illinois where both he and Rheta attended. David is employed by General Motors, Delco Division in Kokomo, Indiana. Rheta resides with her husband and family in Olathe, Kansas, where Charles is in business.

Merle is retired from Standard Oil Co., Jessie from Preferred Risk Insurance Co., where she was employed for 20 years.




J. Fredrick and Emilie Wipperman were early settlers in Grant Twp. NW of Grimes. Mr. Wipperman came to Iowa from Germany in 1866, lived in Amana until 1874, when he bought the land that is known as the Wipperman farm. He was among the first to tile the land, largely advancing its value through modern drainage system.

In 1875, he married Emilie Kuehl, who emigrated from Germany in 1870 with her parents, Gottlieb and Wilhelmine Bartelt Kuehl. They farmed until 1908 when they moved to Grimes, where they resided until their death. J. Fredrick died in 1920, age 77, and Emilie in 1926, aged 71.

Mr. Wipperman was director of Grimes Savings Bank and Grimes Canning Co. and was a promoter and director of Farm Mutual Telephone Co.

They were parents of 11 children: William, died in infancy; Lesetta, Mrs. August Knoll; Ida, Mrs. Robert Knoll; Clara, Mrs. Herman Bartelt, Sr.; Edward; Arthur; Marie, Mrs. William Knoll; Rev. John F.; Herman; August; and Amelia, Mrs. Rufus House. All are deceased.







Arthur Otto Wipperman (son of John Fredrick and Emilie (Kuehl) Wipperman) was born October 1897 in Dallas County near Grimes. He was one of eleven children. When his parents retired from the farm and moved to Grimes, Arthur took over the operation and later purchased the family farm. He lived there until his death in 1940.

In 1910 he married Matilda Greif. There were four children, two daughters and two sons. Pearl Marie married Stanley P. Weiser. Darlene Emilie married Daniel W. Taylor and lives near Minburn. Abbie Wright resides in her home on North Jacob in Grimes.




Ora and Darline Woodring were married June 1934.

Ora is a Mason, he and Darline are members of Eastern Star. Darline is a past Matron. They are members of Grimes Presbyterian Church.





Minnine Evans married Wm Fitch June 1894. They


had one daughter, Lora Irene, born May 1895. Wm Fitch died Sept. 1895.

1. Unusual items: There being only three towns in the world with the name Grimes, and each was founded in (1) at the end of the date; Grimes, Calif. 1851, Grimes, Iowa 1881, Grimes, Okla. 1901. A poem written around 1840 about a man named Grimes became associated with Grimes Canning Factory and also, a drawing of that man.

2. Grimes - Why?

True the Railroad was the industry that caused the founding of Grimes, Iowa, but it was the industrious people of Grimes and the Grimes area that made the town. Other towns had railroads, some even two and two main lines, and some of these towns are "no more" or just "a spot in the road".

From the very first Grimes was not satisfied with General stores. We had our Drug store, and a Dr. also a hotel then came our Churches. Soon the Creamery, that sold \$35,000 of butter in Des Moines in 1902, there was the Grist mill, and the Pill Factory, with City water and a Blacksmith shop also a Machine shop besides an Electric light plant, then there was a Newspaper. There was the Stock Yard, lumber yard and two good elevators. Then came the Bank, Telephone and Canning Factory, etc. Our educational program was good, with the Public School and Farmers Institute. We provided for Area Community Fellowship with the 4th of July celebrations and other celebrations, and we must remember our famous Band before 1890, also 1905-1925. We have had our baseball teams through the years. It was the People in Grimes and Grimes Area that made the town.

Even with the closing of the railroad, Grimes will be the terminal of the railroad line, with no trains going north of Grimes, this means we are an important industrial link to Des Moines. Grimes is a great place and still we can boast of an Industrious people in Grimes and Grimes area.

Again a "thank you" to one and all for your most wonderful cooperation. We testify again how the Lord has guided us in a wonderful way in this History.


Taken in 1921, Jesse Taylor and Jessie May. This house is now at Living History Farm.
