E. School System 1. Public Education

From 1881 to 1902, those living south of what is now Highway 44 attended school that was located about a mile and a half south of Grimes, and those living north of Highway 44 attended school north of town, the school being located about one half mile north of the Railroad tracks on James street. Those attending school in Jefferson township were taken in a wagon called a "Kiddy Wagon."


Francis Ellis writes, "I know that the High School and elementary building were erected in 1902. The first High School graduating class was May 1905. High School was a three year school. The first class consisted of Burt Knight, Dwight Ewing, and Earl Stewart. The class of 1906 was Warren Ewing. The class of 1907 were Glee Parmenter, Verne Knight and Blanche Shafer. (There were 8 but we have the names of only three.) The 1908 class: Carl Hoff, (sometimes the name is Huff and Hoff), Alma Scheonlien, Mary Meneough, Marion Brown, Cora Fryer (now Friar), Henry Meneough, Ruth, Albert and Walter Weiser, Tessis Everett and Francis Ellis. The first superintendent was A. E. Sager; then J. G. Bester, Harry Dunn, Mr. Herrick and Harry Kensinger. Francis Ellis served 1914-1915, and during this time there were around 50 in High School, in 1915 the class graduated 15. The first school board was made up of W. J. Stewart, Henry Seibert and F. A. Ellis." In 1902 the two country schools mentioned above were abandoned.

J. G. Bester had been a teacher over 30 years and authored a book of 76 questions and rhyme statements. A few are: 1. How many bones does the body hold? Two hundred and six worth their weight in gold." 2. How many bones are in the head? There are 28 as I've often said. 3. How many bones in the skull are found? Eight from a box that is nearly round."

The Grimes Advocate newspaper states that the Grimes school building is a 4 room brick structure costing, including furnace and ventilating plant, about \$7,000.





On April 21, 1938 there was a School "Sitdown Strike," at Grimes School, the "strike" was called when the students learned that Andy Crawford, high school instructor and athletic coach had not been offered a contract for the coming year. This was on Thursday and about 10 boys spent Thursday night at the school and the girls returned Friday. School was closed by order of the school board until the following Monday. The school board did then give Mr. Crawford a contract for the following year but he did not return securing a position at another school.

After sixty years as an Independent School District the Department of Public Instruction felt as if Grimes did not have, and did not offer the full amount of subjects for our students. It then became necessary for Grimes to reorganize and two plans were presented. One plan was to go in with Johnston having Johnston-Grimes also the rest of Jefferson and part of Webster township, this would be known as the Northwest Polk Community School. Another plan was to have Grimes, Dallas, and Central Dallas districts go together. None of these plans were put into effect but the final plan we now have was to have Grimes and Dallas Center school district in one district, known as Dallas Center-Grimes Community School District.

3. Preschool

Grimes Early Learning Center was opened in December 1979 at 218 N.W. 3rd Street Place by Marilyn Haugh. The children were offered a wide variety of experiences and freedom to choose according to their interests and abilities.

Daily activities included music, physical development, verbal expression, arts and crafts, etc. Monthly themes were All About Me, Home and Family, Winter, Neighborhood and Community, Spring and Farm Animals. Special visitors and events were: dental hygienist, trip to dispatcher, fire station, postoffice, and bank. Sessions were offered for 3 and 4 year olds. Highlights of the year were Santa's visit, and feeding the animals at a nearby farm.



4. Grimes School, Our Puture

The Grimes school was constructed in 1955 with additions in 1966 and 1975. It has 15 class rooms, a gym and library and a capacity of 450 students.

In 1980 the school operated within their capacity. There has been a substantial increase in population of children under the age of four. Because of the desirability of Grimes for younger couples, future increase in school enrollment can be expected to take place, primarily in the elementary grades.

The site on which the present Grimes school is built is used to capacity.





F. Service Groups 1. General

a. Centennial Committee: In June of 1979 the City Council took formal action to proceed with setting up a committee that would organize, develop, promote and run events for the 1981 Grimes Centennial. Harry and Hazel Stickle were designated as the persons to write a history of the City of Grimes.

b. Lodges: The first lodge in Grimes was the I.O.O.F. lodge and was instituted August 27, 1884 with the following charter members: J. H. Beck, F. P. McClain, Wm. Mollison, Jeremiah Hunt, C. W. Terry and J. H. Gilbreath, (we wondered if that should have S. W. McClain but the copy of the records furnished us said F. P. McClain.) The charter was surrendered May 3, 1964. It was before the turn of the century that they built their I.O.O.F. building with the first floor being used for businesses. This building is still standing on Main Street. The hall was used for school plays, commencement, etc., Farmer's Institute, as well as other lodges. The following lodges were in the area: Grimes Camp No. 1687 of Modern Woodmen of America with W. A. Anderson as head officer and S. E. Shiffer clerk. Homestead No. 144 of the Brotherhood of American Yeoman. In 1902 Harry Taylor was chief officer and L. E. Bennett correspondent of the I.O.O. F. Beaver Lodge No. 235, Degree of Rebekah, with Miss Alta Alen, as Grand Noble and Mrs. Blanch Parmenter secretary. The Webster Camp No. 191 of the I.O.O.F., with S. W. McClain, chief priest and G. A. Stewart, secretary.

c. Legion and Legion Auxiliary: The American Legion has meant much to our country. In Grimes years ago they sponsored the 4th of July celebration. In recent years they have a sweet corn supper. Every year they have a memorial service at Sunny Hill Cemetery, and on that day they place a flag on the grave of all veterans of all wars.

The Congressional Medal of Honor—the highest military award for bravery that can be given to a member of the Armed Services of the United States—dates from the Civil War. It was Senator James W. Grimes of Iowa who in 1861 first introduced a bill in Congress establishing this Medal of Honor.

The Legion Auxiliary has done much in serving our community. They are divided into committees. Some of

these committees are the Americanism committee which has special function on Veteran's Day, Sale of Poppies, Mother's day observance. The Child Welfare committee helps children in our local community, and every year sends support to the national Child Work. There is a Community Service Committee, besides bringing cheer to the sick they also have special giving at Christmas time, and have donated flags to the school. They send a girl once a year to Girls State. Then there is the Rehabilitation Committee that helps veterans in our hospitals.



d. Lions and Lioness: The Lions Club of Grimes was organized May 29, 1947. Mr. Frank Long of the Altoona Lions Club was the speaker as the Altoona club was the sponsor of the Grimes Club.

The major activity of Lionism is sight and hearing conservation, international social, health, citizenship, environmental, recreation, public and educational services.

The local Lions Club works closely with Iowa Lions with the EYE bank at University Hospital at Iowa City. The local Lions Club has cornea donor cards, in fact, a number of donors are from the Grimes area.

One of the most familiar projects that the Lions Club had through the years was their operation of the lunch stand at the Iowa State Fair, which was started August 1952 and ceased in 1978. They first had a stand in a tent and later located their stand in a building. The stand was in the same location for these years, (on the S.W. corner of the lot where the Horse barn is located, and across from the Cattle barn.) Their profits ranged from \$800 to \$3,000 per year through the years.

The projects that the Lions Club have contributed to through the years are too numerous to mention. They have provided for a number of projects at the school, one was \$1,398. for a P.A. system. Contribution to the Library fund, Rescue Unit, 4-H clubs, summer baseball, scouts, etc. They hold safety check programs, testing for Glaucoma here, and also blood pressure clinic.


Through the years they sponsored "Old Grimes Day" with attendance some years of over 1,000. In 1950 they built their Lions building, which is used by others also.

e. Jaycees and Jaycee Ettes: The Jaycee group was organized in April 1973 and a month later the Jaycee Ettes were organized. The first president was Harvey Leners and the present president is John Essy. The Jaycee Ettes were organized with 36 members. In 1980 the officers were Marsha Levisay, president; Judie Day, vice president; Karen Schuster, state director; Carol Hutcheson, secretary; and Janie Kessler, treasurer.

Some of the projects of the groups have and are the Fall Festival, bicycle safety, blue start program, newcomer kits, senior citizens banquet, eye screening for children, pre-school story and craft hour, babysitting clinic, etc. They sponsored the placing of the community billboard, and also donation to ball park light fund and the McDonald House, raising money for the Rescue Unit.

The social events include summer family picnic, hayrack rides and family Christmas party.
